
Representative Hart spoke to the clients emphasizing that they deserved every opportunity to learn about and to use technology. The clients asked many questions.

Charles Ross worked as a laborer only five months ago. Today he has a full-time job with benefits, a desk, telephone and computer. Charles has accomplished a lot; however, he is always striving to do more. Charles, a former BCRC client, went through BCRC's Evaluation and Supported Work Departments, before getting a labor position at the Western PA Cyber Charter School in Midland, PA.

Charles' ultimate goal was to become a nurse's aide. He needed a job to save enough money for the Community College Nurse's Aide program. Gary Hewitt, BCRC Employment Specialist states, "This personal goal of Charles' became a reality in part because Charles had a vision, he defined his dreams and he translated them into a coherent plan; pretty heavy stuff for a young man 21 years old."

With the assistance of BCRC Program Specialist, Sheila Silbaugh, Charles first found a job with the Midland School District, followed by a position at the Midland Cyber School.

Silbaugh exclaims, "He is amazing! He will tell you exactly what he wants, and how he will accomplish it. Charles started at the Cyber School maintenance department, fixing the building, planting flowers and cleaning. He was recently promoted to a job digitally reproducing data to a Compact Disc."

Charles said, "I love my job; the people are so nice here and I really like learning to do new things, like burning CD's. I even have my own desk, my own telephone with an extension and my own computer."

But Charles' work is not done. He still plans on becoming a Certified Nurse's Aide. His plan has two parts. First, because Charles lives in Midland, where there is limited public transportation, he needs a driver's license to get to school. Every Tuesday at 4:00 PM, Charles studies the PA Driver's Manual at the Midland library with Ms. Silbaugh. Charles said of this experience, "Sheila has been wonderful to me. I am learning and I'll be able to take my written test soon, I hope."

Second, Charles realized that he would need to improve his reading skills to handle his college course work. He has registered with Adult Literacy of Beaver County and he faithfully meets his tutor every Wednesday.

Charles Ross is a busy man. He is busy making a plan for his life, and he is busy giving everything he has to fulfilling that plan.



#### **BCRC Receives Training Grant**

BCRC is the recipient of a training grant with a value of almost \$12,000. The grant is from the PA State System of Higher Education, Northern Tier Educational Initiative. Twenty-six BCRC staff have volunteered to participate in the program. Participants log on to the web based curriculum through the Keystone University Network. The program can be accessed through business or home computers that have internet access. BCRC staff are eligible to participate in Desktop Computing Classes, Business and Professional Development courses and Regulatory and Compliance Courses. A few of the available courses are: Thinking Creatively, Time Management, Communication, Motivating Yourself to Perform, Overcoming Challenges, Positively Influencing Others, Increasing Your Assertiveness, Improving Your Memory and Balancing Your Personal and Professional Life. Executive Director Paulette Miller states, "This program is for the benefit of our staff. Along with our regular training, it gives them another chance to grow."
